Tim Lansford of BLAST Seminars served as the master of ceremonies.



### Dallas BA meets with EPA administrator

Dallas Builders Association members met with EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt on August 10 to discuss environmental issues associated with developing new projects in the Dallas area.

Many concerns focused on a misguided expansion of "Waters of the United States" (WOTUS). The misguided proposal, introduced in 2015, attempted to subject much of Texas to costly and time consuming federal water and wetlands

"The Dallas Builders Association commends EPA Administrator Pruitt for holding this roundtable in Dallas to get direct feedback from

home builders and developers who are affected by burdensome regulations that raise the cost of housing and harm small businesses," said Dallas BA President Michael

"We feel like it is important for us to get out, into the states, and talk directly with local people and businesses about how EPA regulations affect them. What we are hearing is that people deeply care about the environment and want sensible regulations that allow them to grow their businesses and create local jobs, without unnecessarily and costly regulatory burdens," said Administrator Pruitt.

## Dallas BA Advocacy Has Successful Summer

Advocacy efforts involving the Dallas Builders Association have helped result in policy shifts that are positive for property owners and home builders. From working to help protect home building in the extraterritorial jurisdiction from over regulation, to coordination with the Texas Association of Builders to push for long needed relief from mitigation fees and partnering with the National Association of Home Builders to provide decision makers in Washington, D.C., real world reasons why a key shift is needed in land and development regulation, a key value of membership is paying off for Association members.

In multiple state legislative sessions, there have been attempts to seek relief from costly tree mitigation ordinances that can needlessly drive up the cost of lot development and negatively impact potential home buyers. In what has been a long legislative course, the Texas Legislature, on Aug. 15, sent House Bill 7 to the Governor's desk with a stamp of approval, where it was signed by Governor Abbott on Aug. 16. The legislation, authored by State Representative Dade Phelan (R-Port Neches) and State Senator Lois Kolkhorst (R-Brenham), will allow property owners the ability to receive tree mitigation fee credits for trees planted.

The legislation requires municipalities that impose mitigation fees in connection with tree removal on a person's property to provide credits for trees planted to offset the remaining mitigation assessed for the tree. To help avoid fees that can pile up due to the lack of capacity on the lot to replant or plant new trees to cover the mitigation, the bill also allows for trees to be planted on mutually agreed upon locations by the municipality and the property owner.

The concept for the credits evolved from an effort, initiated by the Dallas Builders Association, to seek legislation that results in the recognition of the future growth of quality trees planted by builders and developers. Under our state association's coordination, Dallas BA worked with the Texas Association of Builders (TAB) to advocate for legislation that can provide relief for costly tree mitigation fees, while providing for a balanced, market based incentive to plant trees.

During the regular session, legislation containing the same ideas was approved by the state legislature but vetoed by the Governor after he cited

concerns that further protection for property owners rights was needed. The authors of the regular session bill, Representative Phelan and Senator Kolkhorst, re-introduced the legislation in the special session. HB 7 added language to increase the protections and credits for individual existing homeowners, and to prohibit tree mitigation fees on a homeowner if the tree is less that 10 inches in diameter. HB 7 also added provisions that forbid mitigation fees and prohibitions on the removal of trees that are diseased, dead, or pose an imminent or immediate threat to persons or property

The final product is the result of a strong advocacy effort coordinated by TAB that included Dallas BA's significant participation in multiple negotiations, hearing testimonies and meetings.

In an ongoing municipal advocacy effort, work by the Dallas Builders Association helped get certain language in an amendment to a McKinney ordinance that had been requiring city issued building permits for any construction or remodeling of a single-family home on lots that are not subdivided in McKinney's extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ). An amendment, approved by the McKinney City Council on Aug. 15, contains language that removes the requirement for a permit to be obtained in that situation. Important in the effort to turn back the unfair regulation were property owners who, when faced with unacceptable demands and delays, took an inspiring stance to protect their rights.

While this is an important move in protecting property owner rights, more work is needed. McKinney's ordinance still requires vertical building permits on residential units on subdivided lots in its ETJ. Dallas BA believes such a requirement is inappropriate, as there is no statute enacted by the Texas Legislature that grants a city the authority to enact its building regulations in the ETJ. Furthermore, the rights of citizens in the ETJ are being infringed in that those citizens have no rights to petition and seek changes to municipal regulations being imposed on them. Nor can they vote in the elections of city council

At the federal level, a multi-year effort by NAHB that includes work done by Dallas BA, is beginning to move policy in a better direction. On Aug. 15, President Trump issued orders to revoke an overreaching flood plain rule that had been issued in 2015. The Flood Risk Management Standard (FFRMS)

was a flawed expansion of floodplain areas well beyond the 100-year floodplain, without sound technical data or analysis of the regulatory impact. The overreach needlessly harmed housing affordability.

Partnering with NAHB, Dallas BA staff, members and industry allies had offered public comments voicing the home building industry's concern regarding the rule and the negative impacts it could have at a FEMA listening session in April of 2015. NAHB, joined by home builder associations nationwide, continued to advocate on the issue.

The rescinding of the rule was part of a larger order by President Trump to accelerate the building of needed infrastructure.

Also in August, Dallas BA hosted a meeting with Scott Pruitt, administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), to discuss the correct way to draft a rule that defines the "waters of the United States" (WOTUS) and avoid negative impacts of the definition issued in 2015, which is now on hold.

Playing a major role in the discussion of how WOTUS will be redrafted, a dozen members and staff from Dallas BA, were joined by a member from HBA Greater Austin and NAHB staff, as the Association offered first-hand accounts of the needless delays and cost increases that are caused by the misguided rule.

Earlier this year, the Administrator directed the EPA to go back and redraft a WOTUS definition that protects important waters and wetlands, while avoiding regulatory overreach drives up development costs and makes homes less affordable.

While the advocacy efforts mentioned here are just some of the policy areas where Dallas BA is engaged on behalf of our members, they do highlight both the strength and benefits of Association membership.

The City of Dallas has opened a Gold Card Members Only entrance, across the hallway from Room 115. Inside is a dedicated employee who will sign builders in for plan reviews.





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## Dallas BA accepts national Education Excellence Award

The Dallas Builders Association was presented with an Association Excellence Award for Best Education Program during the Association Management Conference in Denver, CO, on Aug. 19. Director of Education Sheena Beaver accepted the award on behalf of the Association, the Education Committee and education title partner StrucSure Home Warranty.

The Association Excellence Awards is an annual program designed to recognize the outstanding accomplishments of state and local HBAs in the field of association management.

Like-sized HBAs compete against each other for the "best of" educational initiatives, communications projects, non-dues revenue generation for programs such as home and garden shows and parades, community service and other categories.

The Dallas BA's highlighted best program was the "2016 Energy Series" developed by the Education Committee and series leader Kevin McLain of Dow Building Solutions. Many months went into planning the program with great effort from all those who assisted in its success. After the passage of HB 1736, it was evident that Dallas area builders and subcontractors would be faced with tougher regulations. The Energy Series helped members find solid solutions and better building practices to meet the more stringent requirements, along with conserving energy, water and bettering the indoor health of DFW homes.

The Association was also able to secure a grant from the EPA to help promote the classes and educate the industry about bettering a home's indoor air quality and water saving programs. The partnership of the EPA and the Association proved to be a success with educating more than 420 individuals in the classroom and countless others through on demand videos. Of those who attended the in house class at the association 53% were builders and 47% are in a supporting role. All in all, these classes gave attendees an advantage in properly building, pricing, incentivizing and educating their buyers on the new requirements and the fundamentals of resource efficient home building.


The partnership with the EPA Region 6 was highlighted at the national EPA meetings and set as a model for other regions, thus encouraging funding local HBA education programs. The EPA shared concern about the indoor air quality and water conservation and was a willing partner to educate Dallas BA members.

"The Education Committee did a

wonderful job by being proactive and enabling members to rise and meet the new regulatory challenge without significant disruption to their business and increasing their ability to meet green


program requirements," Beaver said.

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
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## 2017-19 residential contracts package is now available

- a new lot sale contract addendum, a new consultant-design agreement, an even shorter remodel contract, added advertising and media permissions, revisions to the independent contractor agreements, and a needed revision to the termination damages language;
- performance standard updates and numerous other changes that reflect best practices and up

to date construction transactions; and

■ revised warranty and performance standards to reflect current engineering and construction practices.

A cost effective value that will save thousands of dollars in legal fees, the Texas Association of Builders Texas Residential Construction Contracts package is available to TAB builder and remodeler members only. The cost of the package is only \$399.99 (plus tax).

## Remodelers Council soon to begin Patriot Paws project

Players of all levels are welcome at the Remodelers Council Texas Hold 'em Tournament presented by Pella Windows and Doors on Sept. 21 at the Dallas BA. Proceeds will benefit the Council's Patriot PAWS project, to provide a home that will be used to help acclimate veterans with their service dogs.

Headquartered in Rockwall, The mission of Patriot PAWS is to train and provide service dogs of the highest quality at no cost to disabled American veterans and others with mobile disabilities in order to help restore their physical and emotional independence. A total of 203 dogs have entered the program since its inception in 2006, and there are now 49 dogs in the program. Presently, 72 service dogs have been placed with disabled


individuals. The Patriot PAWS success rate for all placed service dogs is 60% compared to an industry standard of 10%.
